Thank you for your love and support of Lubbock Christian University. I hope you are blessed as you read this issue of Reflections.



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
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Hindsight is Fifty Years of Changed Lives BY WARREN MCNEILL

This story is the continuation of the Hindsight is 20/20 article appearing in the Summer issue of Reflections. That story highlighted a few of the faculty and staff who have been changing lives these first 50 years. This follow-up story illustrates just three of the thousands of students whose lives have been changed through their relationships and experiences at Lubbock Christian University.

When **Jimmy Moore** (**'92**) moved into Johnson Hall in the fall of 1986, he was a tall, skinny kid from Morton,

Texas, who came to play basketball for John Copeland. He is now the principal for Dunbar Middle School in Lubbock.

It was at the end of Jimmy's first semester at LCU when a friend asked to borrow his ID card to sell his books back to the bookstore. The next thing Jimmy knew, he was being summoned to the Dean of Students' office. Apparently this "friend" used Jimmy's ID card in an attempt to sell stolen books back to the bookstore.

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But, John Copeland had already seen the character in Jimmy, even as a new student. It was exhibited to his teammates in the locker room, during practices and in games. Copeland met Jimmy at the Dean's office and assisted him in sorting through the details of the incident.

Jimmy learned two valuable lessons that day. He learned he shouldn't loan his ID card and he learned that there were people on this campus who believed in him. Through this ordeal, he began to understand one of LCU's core values: People are important.

Jimmy's father died when he was young and he viewed many of the men on campus as father figures and mentors. "I had plenty of people step into that role as father figure for me. They helped mold me into the type of man we need to see in the world today."

In his role as a middle school principal, Jimmy has had the opportunity to change the lives of his students just as his life was changed at Lubbock Christian University. "I teach at a poverty school, and I see 'little Jimmy Moores' walking around the halls who don't have much, but one thing they do have in common with all of mankind is that they have a brain and the capacity to learn."

"LCU taught me not to judge a person by their appearance but to look at them as children of God. Knowing that helps me to encourage them to be anything they want to be.


Jimmy also acknowledges that LCU has provided numerous connecting points with people who share his Christian walk. He stays connected with other LCU alumni and friends.

as well as faculty and staff. "LCU continues to provide for me a connection with friends. That connection, that family feeling, continues to this day."

Shelley (Smith) Moore, Jimmy's wife, is a member of the LCU class of 1996.

Dan Sanders ('81) will tell you that he saw something very unique about the culture of LCU even as he was being recruited to play baseball for Larry Hays in 1977. During his first visit to the campus, the young pitching prospect spent the day with coach Hays, but not much time was spent talking about baseball. "I am certain we talked baseball at some point; however, most of what I recall had to do with coach Hays's servanthood—his genuine desire to figure out if he could help me realize my potential as a person. I was impressed."

Dan tells the story of returning home to Houston after his first trip to the campus.



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"What's the stadium like?' my dad asked.

'They don't have a stadium' I replied. 'Where do they practice?' Dad asked. 'I'm not sure,' I said.

'Did they give you a full scholarship?' he asked.

'I'm not sure what kind of scholarship I'm getting,' I remarked.

My dad, the engineer, tried to summarize, 'Hmmm, no stadium, no practice facility, no scholarship details—so why do you want to go there?'

With great confidence I said, 'coach Larry Hays—he cares about me as a person, not just as a baseball player.'

Dan adds that, "Coach Hays had a higher purpose than just coaching baseball." Dan's life was changed in many ways by attending LCU, not the least of which was his claiming Jesus Christ as his savior and being baptized by coach Hays.

Dr. Don Williams was another LCU mentor that helped to shape Dan's

future. After expressing the desire to learn to speak in public, Dr. Williams ensured that Dan competed in speech competitions at colleges and universities across the country.

"In addition to videotaping my talks, he would put me through my paces with impromptu subject matter on which I had just a moment to collect my thoughts and present a speech. In retrospect, this was a wonderful blessing and a clear example of mentoring...he was a gifted speaker himself."


Since graduating from LCU, Dan has enjoyed several successful careers. A highly decorated officer in the U.S. Air Force, he flew U-2 Spy planes, was a pilot trainer at Reese AFB in Lubbock and was member of the presi-

dential lead team that made arrangements for presidential visits around the country. He later was a principal partner in advertising firms specializing in content creation and management, advertising production and consultative services for high-profile corporate, retail and entertainment organizations. Dan and the leadership team grew the company to more than \$100 million in annual sales.

He is currently the CEO of United Supermarkets, a 90 year-old supermarket chain where he spends a great deal of time concentrating on developing a servant-spirited culture.

In fact, his recently written and published book, *Built to Serve*, is on the New York Times Best Seller list after being available for only a couple of





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months. In the book, Dan beautifully illustrates practical and inspirational practices which will help an organization "drive the bottom line with people-first practices."

Dan met his wife, **Shanna** (**Renfro**) – a member of the class of 1982– while they were both students at LCU during the early 1980s.


Marilyn McDermett ('59) hadn't actually planned on attending Lubbock Christian University. In fact it was when Dr. F. W. Mattox spoke at her congregation in Levelland that she decided to "come and help build a college."

During the summer after her senior year in high school, Marilyn was hired to work for the Higgans, who were among the first employees at LCU. As school started, she was hired to work in between classes as a receptionist for Dr. Mattox in the president's office.

She attributes some of the core lessons she has carried throughout her life and career to working in that office and to her other interactions across campus. "Dr. Mattox was such a kind man. He was so committed and dedicated to the college, which made him a very busy individual. Yet he always had time for us as students, and he always had a smile on his face.

"It was easy to get face time with him. All you had to do was show up while a sidewalk was being poured and you could visit while you worked side-by -side."





reer, photographing nature in the Washington, and Virginia countryside. "I will never be an Ansell Adams, but because of God's leading, I have been blessed to be able to focus on the beauty of His creation, capturing the image for others to enjoy."

"I am, of all people, most blessed because I have a God who knows my weaknesses and strengths, and He has guided me all my life. He became so real to me at Lubbock Christian... I am so grateful that I decided to attend Lubbock Christian University."

Calls to the president's office were typically significant in the early days of the college, particularly when Dr. Mattox was trying to raise funds and to get programs off the ground. As a recent high school graduate and entering college freshman, Marilyn accidentally disconnected an important long distance call. "I was very anxious, but Dr. Mattox was so gracious. He told me, 'It was an accident. It could have happened to anyone.' He was always so very calm, confident and in control. We learned a lot about how to handle things in stride."

One of the greatest lessons learned by Marilyn and so many students who have come and gone since her time on campus is about how to walk with Christ. "LCU moved issues of Christian-

ity and relationships with people and with God from the realm of theory to the realm of reality. That's what LCU did for me. He became real to me at LCU and I learned to live in relationship with Him as I walked with fellow students led by professors and staff and by Dr. Mattox."

Working for the U.S. Government in Washington, D.C., was a career that



Marilyn occupied for 31 years. Her penchant for working hard and also knowing how to relate to people and how to stand up for the right thing were keys to her success in that difficult work environment.

Upon her retirement, she was the Associate Managing Director of Operations managing human resources and a budget of over \$100,000,000.


Lubbock native, David Gaschen studied voice with John Gillas while at Texas Tech and graduated with a vocal performance degree in 1993.

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Memorable Visit Highlights End of "Celebrating 50 Years"

or the past year-and-a-half Lubbock Christian University has been celebrating its 50th year of providing a Christian education to thousands of students from all parts of the world. The celebration began in the 2006-2007 school year with the 50th open-

ing chapel and concluded November 6 with a benefit dinner featuring General Colin L. Powell.

Before the address by General Powell, more than 1000 people enjoyed lovely food and fellowship in the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center banquet hall. LCU dining services

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provided the meal and the servers were LCU athletes.

While dinner was being served Dan Sanders, CEO of United Supermarkets and emcee for the evening, got up in front of the crowd and introduced General Powell and Dr. L. Ken Jones, President of LCU. A prayer of thanks was given, and Best Friends sang a beautiful rendition of the Star Spangled Banner.

After dinner, the crowd moved to the Civic Center theatre for the remainder of the program



A short video was played highlighting 50 years of tradition at LCU. Alumni spoke in the video about how truly life changing LCU is, and how they were proud to call it family.


After the video, Dr. Jones had the distinct honor to introduce General Powell. During the four-minute introduction, Dr. Jones said when the event planners were first thinking of whom they wanted to speak over a year ago, "we wanted someone who was like us...." Dr. Jones continued to say that when thinking of people to speak, "the only name considered and even mentioned was that of General Colin Powell."

Dr. Jones continued the introduction by listing the General's accomplishments and awards he has received.

General Powell was born and raised in New York City, the son of immigrant parents from Jamaica. He went to public school in New York City and then on to college at City College of New York (CCNY). While in college at CCNY, Powell participated in ROTC and earned a commission as an Army Second Lieutenant. General Powell has received numerous military and civilian awards and has served four United States presidents: Ronald Reagan, George H.W. Bush, Bill Clinton, and George W. Bush.

Finally, the keynote speaker arrived on stage and was greeted by a standing ovation. Overcome with pride, he had to "shush" the audience so he could start his speech. Powell began by saying he gets hundreds of requests to speak at various events, and when he saw LCU on the list, he did what any person would do: he investigated. Upon investigation of where LCU was and what it stood for, Powell realized that the same values LCU is known for, are also the values he lives by.

General Powell's first time in Lubbock was off to a great start. Powell spoke about his transition since leaving the public spotlight, saying humorously, "one minute you're the Secretary of State, and the next minute ... you ain't."



Continuing on the subject of his transition to private life, Powell said, "I don't miss anything in life. I want to look through the front windshield not the rearview mirror."

General Powell's main topic for the evening was leadership. "Leadership is leadership is leadership," he said. He also went on to say some of the most important aspects of leadership are putting one's followers in the best possible environment, taking care of one's followers, and to recognizing and rewarding one's followers. Powell continued, "Good leaders are those who know how to prune an organization. The essence of all leadership is trust."


As he continued to talk about leadership, he reinforced the idea of America's continuing leadership in the world, saying, "(People)

still want to believe in America ... we (Americans) don't need to sell ourselves short."

General Powell addressed the situation in Iraq by saying that

they (the military) did the right thing at the right time, but once we got there we lost our heads. "We forgot that we weren't just the liberators. We were the occupiers, too."

Powell continued his speech by talking about America as a world power, and that this post-9/11 world has not made America weak.


After his speech came to a close General Powell was asked a few questions by Sanders as the two sat in an informal "set" with leather chairs on the stage.


Sanders asked what Powell considered to be the number one quality of leadership. Powell beautifully said that one

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must have, "a sense of empathy ... leaders who can understand the people ... to get the best out of your followers. Don't let an adversary become an enemy. Convert the enemy into an adversary and then into a friend."

Sanders then asked what kind of impact Powell thought a school like LCU could make on the U.S. Powell responded by stating that "we all have to be the sons and daughters of one God ... schools such as LCU help to give young people and kids something to have faith in."





Next, General Powell was asked who he admired most, in addition to President Ronald Reagan, whom he had referred earlier in his speech. Powell immediately said his parents and family. His parents came from Jamaica to make a life for their children, not for themselves. He knew that whatever he did in life, he better not shame the family. He also added that he truly admired each President he had the honor of working for. He spoke highly of all four (Reagan, Bush 41. Clinton, and Bush 43). Powell spoke of how each of these men were great men, and that they were "all different" when it came to leading the country. He had nothing but praise for each of them.

Sanders ended by ask-

ing the General what was next, to which he responded by saying that he was not anxious to go back into government, but that he is enjoying his life, and enjoying working with young people (which he has gotten to do a lot of lately) and that he will simply see what the future holds.

General Powell is currently spending his time raising money for the Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial that will be added to the Mall in Washington D.C. and also for an education center for the Vietnam Memorial, the most visited memorial in Washington.

After the fourth-or-so standing ovation, Mr. Randy Andrews (his company, Graco Real Estate, was sponsor of the event) and presented General Powell with a personalized pair of spurs. 50 years ago, Powell was just beginning his career, and LCU was just being formed out of a lifeless field of cotton. Andrews mentioned that in West Texas, giving one spurs is a sign of respect and admiration. The General was overwhelmed with gratitude when he was presented with the spurs, which bore the initials "CLP."



Another standing ovation from the crowd followed the presentation, which was highlighted by a light-hearted moment where the General did a little "shuffle" step on the stage in reference to his days as a drill team leader. As the crowd stood in respect, General Powell waved and left the stage.

The General spoke for almost an hour, and the crowd never grew tired of his speech. They hung on every word that was said, laughed in the appropriate places, and clapped in approval for one of the most respected world





leaders of our time. The General said great things about LCU, Dr. Jones, and West Texas. The wonderful people of West Texas made him feel at home.



Family Reunion Founders' Weekend Recap

arilyn McDermett ('59) greeted each person who entered the Arnett House as a long-lost relative who finally came home for a visit.

"This is family; we grew up together," she said.

McDermett is referring to the first students who attended Lubbock Christian University. In October, LCU welcomed back its family for Founders' and Family Weekend. The weekend kicked-off with a reunion for the classes of 1959 and 1960 at the Arnett House. And Marilyn was there to make everyone feel welcome.

The group acted like family, reminiscing about shared experiences. They recalled walking across campus in muddy shoes after a rain storm because there were no sidewalks and marveled at the physical changes to campus over the past 50 years. The one thing everyone seemed to remember was the relocation of the Rhodes-Perrin Field House from New Mexico to the south side of the LCU campus.

The building had to be disassembled before it could be moved to LCU, and Bob Privett ('59) helped with that

process. He remembers standing on the roof to remove the joints as well as sleeping in an abandoned barrack building with the other student, faculty and staff volunteers.

"There wouldn't be a Lubbock Christian if these people didn't agree to come here," McDermett acknowledged.

The Rhodes-Perrin Field House was one of the many

contributions the first students and employees made to the university. Another contribution was the university's choral tradition, and a large part of the weekend was devoted to a Choral Reunion. Almost 300 people gathered to pay tribute to the people musical legacy of Dr. Hinds and Brother Cox and to recognize Dr. Camp for continuing that here." legacy with the university's current choral program.

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"Dr. Camp taught us to think about the words and the message of the songs and not just the technical aspects," Jenn said.

Beginning 1960. Brother Cox directed the Meistersingers. Brother Cox passed away in June of 2000, but his son Eddie Cox ('82) accepted the plaque honoring his father's legacy from Dr. Byron Rogers, Chairman of the LCU Mathematics and Physical Sciences Department and a former Meistersinger. Eddie, along with his sister and brother, Charla (Cox) Cobb ('79) and tradition at LCU in 1957 when he established the Acappella chorus and when he added the Meistersinger Chorus in 1960. Both groups traveled across the country recruiting for the school and sharing the gospel.

In addition to a plaque, three ladies, Becky (Evans) Bock ('79), Tambia (Fincher) Gerble ('80) and Sherry (Butler) Casella ('83), presented Dr. Hinds with a hand-stitched quilt with icons representing LCU chorus making up the pattern and the words from Matthew 20:28 sewn into the design. Throughout the weekend, chorus alumni were asked to sign the quilt, so when Dr. Hinds left with it, it carried the names of the students he impacted while at LCU.


Although each generation of chorus students at LCU had different experiences and different directors, a common thread united the generations.

"Through music, souls can be won, hearts can be touched and lives can be changed" was a line from the Lessons we Learned from Dr. Hinds plaque that was presented by **James Crowder** ('64) on behalf of all former Acappella Chorus members.

That sentiment was echoed by **Marsha** (**Exum**) **Gifford** ('**69**), a travel agent who has helped Dr. Hinds plan trips for choral alumni to different destinations in Europe.

"Wherever Dr. Hinds leads, I'll follow, because I know he'll end up in Heaven," she said.

The group ended the evening the best way it knew how: with singing. Dr. Hinds led the song "The Lord Bless You and Keep You." Almost everyone in the room was trained to sing, many by Dr. Hinds, and the beautifully blended harmonies reflected the passion of a group of people expressing their love of the Lord and each other through song.



Dr. Camp has directed Praise Choir and Chamber Singers since 1997, and Jenn (Wood) Whitehead ('03) presented him with a plaque in honor of his accomplishments. Jenn sang in Praise Choir and Chamber Singers all five years she was a student at LCU. She also took seven major tours with Dr. Camp, including traveling to Australia and Ireland.

Ernie ('88) sang in Meistersingers while their father was the director.

"It's very humbling to see the love people have for my father," Eddie said. "It makes me appreciate people like Dr. Hinds, who gave him the opportunity to be here."

Dr. Wayne Hinds started the choral

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The weekend also included two performances of "The Man in the Cotton Field," the show written by **Dr. Don Williams** ('62), Dean of the Hancock College of Liberal Arts, featuring original music by **Tim McKenzie** ('77),

children's book author and member of Blue Prairie, and **Dr. Byron Rogers** ('81), Chair of the Mathematics and Physical Sciences Department. The production focused on the events that occur in a typical college student's

life and revisited key moments in the university's 50-year history. The play demonstrated that though styles of hair, clothes, and cars may change, students from different periods all share the same energy, excitement for life, and creativity as they move through the college years.

Baseball alumni were also part of this celebration weekend. More than fifty alumni descended on Hays Field to challenge the LCU baseball team to a nine-inning regulation game on Saturday. Larry Hays ('64), former LCU head coach and current head coach at Texas Tech University, threw the ceremonial first pitch to start the game. It was a high scoring game, but the varsity team edged out a victory against the alumni (16-11) even though Zach Bar-

nard ('06) hit a grand slam in the ninth





inning. The baseball alumni also gathered Friday night for a cookout outside the Rip Griffin Center. LCU Athletics cooked for several hundred alumni, family, friends, employees and student athletes.

Approximately 460 people attended a dinner Saturday night honoring founders, founding families, and several LCU traditions. The dinner was held in the Rhodes-Perrin Field House, the same building Bob Privett and many other founding faculty, staff and students helped bring to campus.

Dr. L. Ken Jones, LCU President, began the evening by rec-



ognizing the "most renowned, honored, famous name in the history of LCU: Dr. F. W. Mattox," the university's first president, for his vision and servant attitude. Many of Dr. Mattox's family members were in attendance. Next honored the founding families the people, faculty, and staff that helped



established LCU. Sixty members of the faculty or staff who worked at the college in the first five years were on hand to receive medallions in gratitude for their efforts to secure LCU's success.

Dr. Harvie Pruitt and **Dr. Steven Lemley** ('65) were honored as former university presidents. Don Baldridge and family members of Dr. M. Norval Young were also among those recognized as men from the original committee who began the vision of a Christian college in Lubbock. "These are the people that said we have to find a leader

who can take this from zero into something special," Dr. Jones said.

They were presented with a custom-made pen created out of wood from the elm trees that stood in front of the Adminis-**Building** tration from 1957 until 2007 when they were taken down to make room for the new welcome center that will become the new "front door" of the campus. Dr. Larry Rogers ('06), former LCU Professor of Kinesiology,

hand crafted these



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pens especially for this occasion.

Dr. Jones also recognized two LCU traditions that have been instrumental in continuing to promote the university especially to prospective students: the camp tradition and the choral tradition.

Students that attend Encounter or Camp Champion today probably have no idea that it was known as Youth Advance for many years and started as a music camp created by Dr. Hinds. People like Marsha Gifford came to LCU after attending music camp with Dr. Hinds and numerous students chose LCU after spending their summers at Camp Champion and Encounter with John King, Summer Camps Director and Vice President of University Relations.

A survey of entering freshman is taken each fall to determine how these new students became interested in attending Lubbock Christian University. Each year, the response that gets the highest marks is summer camps.

Although the camp legacy continues, it's the school's choral tradition Dr. Hinds is most associated with.

"I can't say enough about what we owe to the choral tradition," Dr. Jones said. "Choral traditions have inspired so many of our students and alumni."

The Williams family is one example of that inspiration. Kelijon (Williams Nance ('85), her parents Kirby ('60) and Jonnie ('61) Williams, and her sister Heidi (Williams) Hooten ('89) all attended LCU and sang in the chorus with Dr. Hinds. Kelijon's son, Karson, began his college career at LCU this fall and continues the Williams family legacy of singing in an LCU chorus.

"When you're a Christian, you have that family; when you're at LCU, you have that family; but when you're in chorus, it's a deeper family," Nance said.

Just like the Choral Reunion Dinner on Friday night, the Founder's Dinner ended in singing, this time with the Alma Mater, which was composed by Dr. Hinds and his wife, Yvonne, in 1957.


The weekend concluded after a worship service held in the McDonald Moody Auditorium with lots of singing led by several former members of the LCU choruses. Following the worship service, the huge Alumni Reunion Chorus spread all over the auditorium stage to sing several numbers directed by Dr. Hinds and Dr. Camp. Also directing the chorus was Eddie Cox, leading in his father's stead. The final song was commissioned specifically for this weekend to celebrate 50 years of the LCU choral tradition and Byron Rogers directed the song which he composed.

And of course, "The Lord Bless You and Keep You" was sung as a final blessing for everyone in attendance. As the last chord faded into silence, the robust sounds of good friends saying their farewells filled the auditorium.

The weekend of celebrating had come to a close but not before founders and friends, alumni and current students found joy and comfort in connecting and reconnecting on a campus filled with 50 years of memories.






Sports Wrap



Women's Volleyball

The Lady Chap Volleyball team concluded a banner 2007 season at the NAIA Region VI Tournament, which was played in the Rip Griffin Center on the LCU campus.

For head coach Jennifer Lawrence, a stellar group of Lady Chaps, and, indeed, all of the Lady Chap faithful, the 2007 campaign was one to remember.

For the first time in her four years as head coach of the Lady Chaps, coach Lawrence amassed 30 wins, finishing 30-8. Also for the first time, she went undefeated in Sooner Athletic Conference play, finishing a perfect 12-0 and capturing her third SAC regular season title in four years.

In addition, her Lady Chaps likewise ran the table at the SAC post-season tournament, capturing that championship before advancing to the NAIA Region VI tourney, where they entered the field as the #2 seed. For her efforts, she was named the Sooner Athletic Conference Coach of the Year, her second such accolade (2005).

Setter Rachel Stuyvesant was named a first-team All-SAC selection and both the Sooner Athletic Player and Setter of the Year. The sophomore from Albuquerque, NM, finished the season with 1,653 assists, the fourth best single season in school history, and she was also named to the NAIA Region VI first-team as well as Setter of the Year.

Joining her on the NAIA Region VI first-team was libero Courtney Yonke. The sophomore from Lubbock Coronado set the LCU single season record for digs with 947, eclipsing the old mark of

838 set by Hayley Geer in 2005. Yonke was likewise an all-SAC first-team honoree as well as the NAIA Region VI and Sooner Athletic Conference Libero of the Year, and the week of October 24th, Yonke became the first Lady Chap to be named the NAIA National Libero of the Week.

The only other Lubbock Christian player to be honored on the NAIA Region VI level was Suzanne Childress, who landed on the second-team. A junior from Katy, Childress led the Lady Chaps with 437 kills, the 8th best single season performance, and she was tied for the team lead in aces (46) and second in digs (479). In the SAC, she was a first-team selection as well as the Newcomer of the Year.

Katie McGuire was a second-team All-SAC honoree this season as well as the lone all-tournament selection at the NAIA Region VI championship. She finished the season with 391 kills, 43 aces, and 103 total blocks.

Joining McGuire on the SAC secondteam was Kelsey Odell, a sophomore from Canyon. The 2006 SAC Freshman of the Year, this season, Odell was tied for the team lead in aces (46) and finished with 348 kills.

The other two honorees in 2007 for the Lady Chaps were Brittany Hix and Elissa Loynes. Hix, a junior from Canyon, tallied 276 kills and 68 blocks while Loynes, a true freshman from Kemah, tallied 284 kills and led the team in blocks with 112 total blocks. For their efforts, both Hix and Loynes were named all-Sooner Athletic Conference Honorable Mention.

Perhaps most notable about the 2007 version of the Lady Chaps is the fact that there were no seniors on the roster. This speaks well for the future of Lady Chap volleyball, as the youthful exuberance translated into wins in 2007, and now with another year of experience, 2008 has the potential to bring even more championships.

Women's Basketball

After back-to-back seasons of unparalleled success in the history of Lubbock Christian University basketball, expectations are once again high for the Lady Chaps as the curtain goes up on the 2007-2008 campaign.

A year ago, LCU went 26-7, 15-3 in Sooner Athletic Conference play, advanced to the Sweet Sixteen of the NAIA National Tournament, and won a share of the SAC regular season championship for the first time in school history.



This season, the Lady Chaps look to continue to build on the winning tradition head coach Steve Gomez and his staff have established in their short four years here, and remain a serious contender for the Sooner Athletic Conference crown

before hopefully making another run at the NAIA National Tournament next March.

At the end of last season, it looked as if the Lady Chaps would be tougher than ever in 2007-2008 as only one senior (Talita Aguiar) would not be back from last year's team. However, a mid-summer knee injury to NAIA third-team All-American Ashley Hunter has raised some questions about this year's version of the Lady Chaps, and their ability to remain successful will rely heavily on a veteran group of upperclassmen.

Point Guard

Lubbock Christian's ability to score will begin at the point guard position where two year starter and third-team All-SAC performer Sierra Wilcox-Lovorn returns for her junior season. Newly married, Wilcox-Lovorn hopes to continue the trend she and the Lady Chaps established last season when she handed out 149 assists and the team tallied more assists than turnovers.

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Playing behind Wilcox-Lovorn at the point will be Jennifer Hughes and Ashley Coggins.

Hughes, a senior from Jacksboro, has played a myriad of roles for the Lady Chaps over the years. A sophomore out of Coppell High School, Coggins' role increased as last season wore on, and her ball handling ability combined with her shooting ability will make her a viable option off of the bench.

Shooting Guard / Small Forward
The two and the three positions for the
Lady Chaps are the most interchangeable on the floor as Gomez's scheme allows for a lot of movement to and from
the perimeter to create opportunities on
the offensive end via mismatches.

That said, these positions require versatility, and no Lady Chap has been more versatile over the last two years than reigning Sooner Athletic Conference Player of the Year and second-team NAIA All-American Jordan Hampton. A season ago, Hampton led LCU in scoring and rebounding at 17.0 points and 6.5 boards per game, and she will once again be called upon to set the tone for the Lady Chaps in 2007-2008.

Backing her up and playing on the opposite side of the court will be a diverse group of Lady Chaps whose unique abilities provide Gomez with the offensive and defensive options he so readily makes use of.

Sophomore Brandi Raindl appeared in 32 games last season, averaging 5.0 points and 4.4 rebounds each night out, and she has proven that she is a big game player. Sophomore Kirsten Niehues likewise returns from last season, when she played in 22 games and shot .516 from the floor. A pair of freshmen could also see significant time on the perimeter for Lubbock Christian as two Lubbock natives in Bailey St. Clair and Renee Wilson have made their way across town to LCU.

In the Paint

In 2006-2007, the Lady Chaps overachieved at the post position as Kim Lloyd and Talita Aguiar were the primary options with Hampton and Raindl filling in after Carolyn Manning went down in the pre-season with a knee injury.

In 2007-2008, with Manning fully recovered and the addition of Severyn Smith and, potentially, Dina Shinault, Lubbock Christian looks to be much deeper in the paint.

A year ago, Kim Lloyd was named a Sooner Athletic Conference honorable mention after averaging 8.7 points and 5.3 rebounds per game. She will once again be the muscle for the Lady Chaps on the inside, but she will not always have to play the five.

That responsibility will most likely fall to Manning, who in 2005-2006, averaged 8.89 points and 4.83 rebounds per game en route to an All-SAC honorable mention accolade of her own. With quick feet uncharacteristic of most post players, Manning can run the floor and will keep defenses moving as the game wears on.

Smith, a graduate of Randall High School, could see ample playing time as a true freshman. She will provide a viable offensive option as well as a solid, physical presence that will attack the boards.

In the end, the outlook is bright for the 2007-2008 version of the Lubbock Christian University Lady Chaps. Once again, Gomez and his staff have assembled a fine group of young women who have the athletic ability to maintain LCU's place near the top of the Sooner Athletic Conference standings and the potential to make a little noise come March at the NAIA National Tournament.

Men's Basketball

Between 2000 and 2005, the Lubbock Christian University Men's basketball team made three trips to the NAIA National Tournament and won both a Sooner Athletic Conference regular season (2003-2004) and Sooner Athletic Conference tournament (2001) championship.



As the curtain goes up on 2007-08 the season, head coach John Copeland and the LCU Chaparrals look to continue their ascent in the SAC and, hopefully, make a ifourth trip to

the NAIA National Tournament in Kansas City next March. The reason for the optimism lies in a strong recruiting class that should compliment a solid nucleus of returning players and will provide the Chaps with depth and versatility they have not enjoyed since 2004-2005.

At the Point

Justin Tatum, a sophomore from Tyler John Tyler High School, was primarily a defensive option a year ago, but his offensive production has improved over the summer as he has developed into a solid shooter. Splitting time with Tatum will be junior Tyler Hill. A local product from Trinity Christian, Hill has steadily improved over the course of his three years at LCU, and he is now a low mistake player who sees the floor well and will provide key ball handling off of the bench.

On the Perimeter

Many of Copeland's offensive and defensive options will come at both the two and the three, where the Chaps will suit up five players, four of which have at least one year of experience at Lubbock Christian.

Those returners include Munir Shakir, D.J. Cameron, Clay Roberts, and Tay-

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lor Wilson, and the lone newcomer is Tommy Lane. Shakir, a senior from Howard College, is the Chaps' top returning scorer having averaged 8.48 points per game last season. Cameron, much like Shakir, will provide veteran leadership, and he will be in the mix as a consistent scorer from the perimeter. Both Roberts and Wilson redshirted in 2006-2007, and with a year to adjust to the college game, they are now ready to hone their skills on the court.

Sophomore junior—college transfer Tommy Lane will be called upon to shoulder much of the scoring burden for the Chaps this season. A former Clarendon College Bulldog, Lane brings an explosive element to the floor, and his athleticism will give him the ability to create scoring opportunities.

Down Low

With the loss of Max Eding and Marques Baldwin, scoring will be at a premium for the Chaps, and the majority of that ground will be made up at the forward position, where a quartet of newcomers will bear the burden.

Nick Hatcher was a teammate of Tommy Lane at Clarendon, though he transfers in as a junior. A smooth player, he has the ability to slash and find open lanes for easy lay-ups. Jacob Klockenga played his junior college ball at Collin County Community College, where he was voted the Cougars' Most Improved Player last season. He has a solid shot to go along with a good feel around the basket, and his toughness means that he will be called upon to do much of the dirty work for LCU.

Joining Klockenga in the trenches will be Derrick Huffman, a junior college transfer from Holmes Community College. He is energetic on the inside, but also has the ability to step back and shoot the ball if need be.

Perhaps the biggest reason for the Chaparral faithful to be hopeful about the future of LCU basketball is Kenny Hewitt, one of the most noteworthy LCU signings in recent memory. A freshman out of North Mesquite High School and a Texas Top 100 prospect,

Hewitt is a young talent who will contribute on both ends as a scorer and primary defender.

In the Middle

As is always the case in the Sooner Athletic Conference, a solid presence in the middle is vital to success. Three players will play in the four or five positions for the Chaps this season: Bernardo Rocha, Drazen Minic, and Kurt Kerns.

Rocha is now in his third year at Lubbock Christian. He averaged 6.38 point and 3.6 rebounds per game last season, and he will need to improve his production in both respects to keep the Chaps in tough games down the stretch. Minic, a senior from Hawaii Pacific University, appeared in 24 games last season, and he will be a nice alternative to Rocha as Minic can stretch the floor with an outside shot and even shoot the three. Kerns, a sophomore transfer from the University of Texas - Permian Basin, will be a big body off the bench and should provide a physical presence in the middle.

All in all, there is reason to be optimistic about the 2007-08 men's basketball season. Scoring will be a question, but given Copeland's coaching ability, his 27 seasons of experience, and the solid recruiting class he has brought in, if the Chaps can gel early, LCU is poised to continue to climb the Sooner Athletic Conference standings and return to prominence on the national level.

Women's Cross Country

On a cold and blustery day much farther north than they are used to running, Lady Chap sophomores Birttani Borden-Sigle and Imma Kosgei returned

Borden-Sigle finished the 5K (3.1 miles)

with a time of 19:20.4, running at a pace of 6:14 per mile, to finish 120th. Kosgei finished 251st with a time of 21:03.2 with a pace of 6:47 per mile.

As a team, the Lady Chaps concluded the 2007 season by competing simultaneously in both the Sooner Athletic Conference and NAIA Region VI Cross Country Meets on Saturday morning at the Gordon Cooper Vocational Technology Center. The Lady Chaps improved upon their 5th and 7th place performances a year ago. This year, LCU finished fourth in the Sooner Athletic Conference and fifth in NAIA Region VI.

Men's Cross Country

The Lubbock Christian University Men's Cross Country Team concluded the 2007 season by competing simultaneously in both the Sooner Athletic Conference and NAIA Region VI Cross Country Meets at the Gordon Cooper Vocational Technology Center.



As a team, the Chaps repeated their performance from a year ago by finishing fifth in the SAC and seventh in NAIA Region VI. On an individual level, however, Lubbock Christian made great strides by improving their overall time and

lowering their total points.

Freshman Joshua Katam became the first All-Sooner Athletic Conference and All-NAIA Region VI performer in the Clyde Neff era by finishing 13th and 14th in the two races with a time of 26:00 in the 8 K event.

Baseball

The NAIA released it preseason Top 25 baseball poll, and for the second consecutive season, the Chaps find themselves in the Top 10, landing at #7.

After advancing farther than any other Sooner Athletic Conference school for the second consecutive year, Lubbock Christian finds itself ranked #1 in NAIA

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Region VI, ahead of perennial SAC powerhouse Oklahoma City University and 2007 NAIA Region VI runner-up, the Red River's Texas Wesleyan University.

OCU is currently ranked #9, TWU is #18, and Southern Nazarene is receiving votes.

In addition to the national rankings, the NAIA also recently released the 2008 Pre-Season Baseball All-Americans, and Lubbock Christian University senior second baseman Buck Britton is on the list.

A transfer from Stephen F. Austin University, Britton was a first-team All-Sooner Athletic Conference, first-team All-NAIA Region VI, and NAIA All-American Honorable Mention in 2007.

In 2007, the Chaps went 37-17, finished second in the Sooner Athletic Conference and third in NAIA Region VI. LCU will open the season on January 25th, when the University of Texas – Brownsville comes to Hays Field for a two-day, four-game set.

Women's Golf

With her 77 in round two, Lubbock Christian University junior Kelly Rain-



bolt finished with a twoday total of 152 and captured the first championship in LCU history by winning

the individual title at the OCU Women's Fall Classic hosted by Oklahoma City University and played at the Lincoln Park Golf Course.

Cooler than expected temperatures combined with sustained 30 mile-per-hour winds on day two accounted for the higher than expect scoring, but Rainbolt and the rest of her Lady Chap teammates persevered, finishing second as a team for the second week in a row, 13 shots behind host and defending

NAIA National Champion Oklahoma City, and 28 shots better than Sooner Athletic Conference opponent Southern Nazarene University, who finished 3rd.

The OCU Women's Fall Classic concluded the fall portion of the Lady Chaps' schedule, and the girls are now into off-season in preparation to build on their unprecedented fall success next spring.



Men's Golf

The Lubbock Christian University Men's Golf Team concluded the fall portion of its schedule when it competed in the 2007 Sleep Inn & Suites Classic hosted by Oklahoma Christian

University, played at Oak Tree Country Club.

The Chaps shot a 613 and finished 11th in the 19 team field, which included eight teams who competed at last year's NAIA National Tournament, including defending national champion Oklahoma City, who won the event. Though officially playing as an independent, Will Kinnaird posted the best finish for the Chaps, landing in a tie for 24th place with scores of 72 and 78 for a two round total of 150.

LCU finished ahead of SAC opponents Oklahoma Baptist and Southern Nazarene and behind SAC opponent Oklahoma City. The Chaps will now enter into their off-season program in anticipation for the Spring schedule, which has not been set, but is expected to begin in February.

Softball

The newest version of the Lady Chaps, the Lubbock Christian University Softball Team, made its debut the weekend of October 6th by playing five scrimmages over the course of two days versus Texas Tech University, West Texas A&M University, Midland College, and Clarendon College.

The Lady Chaps managed wins over Clarendon College and Midland College, but lost to Texas Tech in their first day of action. After splitting two contests on the second day of the event, LCU came away from the first weekend of activity with a mark of 3-2 overall.

The Lady Chaps then concluded the fall portion of their schedule with a trip to Las Vegas, Nevada in early November. LCU defeated Cypress College, split with the College of Southern Idaho and lost to UNLV.

LCU will open the regular season in Hobbs, NM, on February 19th before christening Plains Capital Park versus the defending NAIA National Champion Oklahoma City University Stars on February 21st.

Chaparral Ridge Golf Course Opens on LCU Campus

(Excerpts from Lubbock Avalanche-Journal article by Jeff Walker.)

Chaparral Ridge Golf Course, a 9-hole links-style course, has changed the landscape of the LCU campus on the corner of 34th Street and Frankford Ave. After 18 months of construction the course opened in June 2007.

After selling his coffee business, Walter Hand planned to settle into retirement. While visiting friends who were discussing the LCU land adjacent to 34th Street and Frankford, Hand said if they could find a place to put the dirt they should build a golf course.

A few weeks later, Hand received a phone call asking if he was serious. LCU agreed to lease the land to Hand for a golf course that he operates and manages.

Hand drew a sketch of how he envisioned the nine-hole course to look and took it to George Williams in Abilene who has designed other courses. Hand said he had the average golfer in mind when designing the course layout.

"I don't like to spend a lot of time looking for golf balls," Hand said. While the layout might be different at Chaparral Ridge, the yardage is close to that of the Rawls from the championship tees. The Rawls, an 18-hole course that serves as home for the Texas Tech University golf teams, measures 7,207 yards. Two rounds at the nine-hole Chaparral Ridge course would equal 6,940 yards.

Future plans for Chaparral Ridge, which is open seven days a week from sunrise to sunset, include a driving range on the course's playa lake and a pitch-and-putt facility



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near the clubhouse.

Right now, a deep hole sits where the range will be completed and also serve as a geothermal heating and air lake for LCU. Hand said he got the idea of the floating driving range while on vacation in Florida.

"For people in West Texas, a floating range is unheard of," Hand said. "I was in Orlando and I'd get up at five every morning and take a few clubs to the driving range that was nearby. I got to visiting with a guy that used to coach a college there and all you could see on the range was the landing area.

"Byron Nelson once said a professional golfer looks at water and only sees the landing area. The amateur golfer only sees the water. I think the floating islands would greatly improve the golfers' games here."

The timetable for completion of the range, though, is affected significantly by local weather. Every time it rains, he said, the water has to be pumped out before digging can continue.

Mr. Hand has generously added a benefit for LCU alumni and former students by offering \$5 off the green fee with a cart rental. 
